Tennessee's motor vehicle death rate is at an alarming 21.3 deaths per 100,000 people, which is 42% higher than the national average.*

To address this serious problem, which caused 1,160 deaths in the state of Tennessee last year, Mayor Ron Littlefield and the City of Chattanooga are implementing a series of road safety cameras at high risk intersections and roadways throughout the city.

RED LIGHT CAMERAS will be implemented to reduce the risk of collisions caused by red light running, which is the number one cause of motorist injury in the United States.

SPEED CAMERAS will also be used to decrease the number of speed related accidents, which account



for 30 percent of all fatal crashes.

A 30-DAY INTRODUCTION PERIOD WILL BEGIN ON JUNE 15, 2007. Traffic violators photographed during the 30-day introductory period will receive a warning. After the 30 days, citations will be issued to violators.

Additional enforcement systems will have a 30 day warning period prior to citations being issued to violators.
